MOTION FOR PARTY STATUS OF THE CONCENTRATING SOLAR POWER ALLIANCE

Pursuant to Rules 1.4(a)(4) and 11.1 of the California Public Utility Commission's ("Commission") Rules of Practice and Procedure, the Concentrating Solar Power Alliance ("CSPA") respectfully files this motion for party status in the above-captioned docket, R.11-10-023.

The CSPA is a public policy advocacy organization dedicated to bringing increased awareness and visibility to concentrating solar power ("CSP") technology, which is both a sustainable and dispatchable technology. CSP is a unique renewable energy resource that provides clean electric power and a range of operational capabilities that support the continued reliability and operational flexibility of electric power systems. CSPA consists of developers and suppliers who advocate for the increasing acceptance, adoption and implementation of CSP technology and thermal energy storage. Our membership includes many of the world's largest CSP corporations and their supply-chain partners, including Abengoa, BrightSource Energy, Cone Drive Gearing Solutions, Lointeck and Wilson Solarpower. Our objectives include advancing the industry's value proposition, addressing issues of job creation and environmental sustainability, and setting the foundation for future uses of the technology. The nature and

extent of regulations implemented pursuant to this proceeding will directly affect the

opportunities available for CSPA's members to participate in California's electricity markets.

This proceeding is evaluating the Commission's Resource Adequacy ("RA") program

and, more specifically, RA for distributed generation, flexible capacity and other modifications

to the RA program. CSPA and its members commend the Commission for its efforts to enhance

the existing RA program in response to the evolving resource mix and operational needs of

California's electric power grid.

Comprised of developers and suppliers of CSP, the CSPA has a strong interest in this

proceeding. CSPA and its members will be particularly affected by the Commission's

development of a flexible procurement mechanism under the RA program and the determination

of which resources are eligible for inclusion under this program, as developers and supplies of

CSP, an unconventional flexible resource. As a result, CSPA has a direct and substantial interest

in this proceeding that cannot be represented by any other party. CSPA's participation in this

proceeding will not prejudice any other party, delay the proceeding, or unduly expand its scope.
