 - a. SB 750 (Wolk) This bill would require the installation of water meters or submeters for newly constructed multiunit residential structures to measure water supplied to each individual dwelling unit. The measure is a reintroduction of last session's AB 19, and the prior session's AB 1975. The bill's sponsors include the Natural Resources Defense Council (NRDC). This bill has been referred to the Senate Judiciary Committee, but a hearing date has not yet been set.
 - b. AB 115 (Perea) This bill would authorize the Department of Public Health to fund projects, by grant, loan, or a combination of the two, where multiple water systems apply for funding as a single applicant for the purpose of consolidating water systems or extending services to households relying on private wells. The bill would require a legal entity to exist that is not necessarily the applicant, but that has the authority to enter

into contracts and incur debt on behalf of at least one of the communities to be served and has the right to operate at least one of the public water systems under a lease or memorandum of understanding with a term of at least 20 years. The purpose of the bill is to extend applicant eligibility to larger water suppliers with the expertise to assist disadvantaged communities that have contaminated drinking water sources. The bill was heard on March 12 in the Assembly Environmental Safety and Toxic Materials Committee. The bill passed on a vote of 7-0. The bill was then heard in the Assembly Appropriations Committee on April 10 and placed on the consent calendar. This bill will now be heard on the Assembly floor.
