We just had our weekly call. Many people were gone though (Andy Smith at a training, Insignia's Keith Miller on vacation, and Nick Fisher who is the lead PG&E monitor). I'm getting a little concerned because we discussed the June 6th incident where PG&E crews were working outside of a work area without getting clearance to work through a CPUC variance approval. They had been told by Nick Fisher that they couldn't begin work until that variance was approved, but they started work anyway. The people on the call today were unsure who gave that direction, but said it should be in the non-compliance report. What is really concerning to me is that this happened two weeks ago and we don't have any written conclusion from PG&E on why it happened. I realize there was a stand down with the crew, which I think is a great first step, but it's not clear to me whether PG&E knows why it happened. If PG&E does not know why it happened, why is construction continuing? It may be that PG&E knows and has not communicated it, but I can't be sure of that.

Going forward, I think we should expect PG&E to turn around these reports within a couple of days and figure out why the turn around is not happening faster right now. Maybe that is something you can discuss with Steve.
