REQUEST FOR FIRST-TIME REPRESENTATIVE HOURLY RATE FOR LYNN HAUG

Explanation of request for hourly rate and summary of experience

Vote Solar requests a first-time representative hourly rate for Lynn Haug, Vote Solar's external counsel and attorney for California regulatory matters, of \$395/hour for 2012 and 2013. Ms. Haug has no previously adopted rate approved by the Commission.

Ms. Haug has been practicing law as a member of the California Bar for more than 23 years and has spent most of her time during those years working as an energy regulatory attorney representing various clients in proceedings before state and federal energy regulatory bodies, including the Commission. Prior to becoming an attorney, Ms. Haug's professional activities included working for 2 years on the staff of the Wisconsin Citizens Utility Board.

Over the past 23 years, Ms. Haug has represented various clients in a wide spectrum of Commission proceedings, including rate cases, rulemaking proceedings, complaint cases, and enforcement matters. Ms. Haug has represented companies manufacturing, selling and distributing electric generation systems, independent power producers, qualifying facilities, electric industry trade associations, publicly-owned utilities and irrigation districts, large institutional customers of the investor-owned utilities, providers of metering and electric vehicle charging services, and the Western Electricity Coordinating Council.

Along with other attorneys from Ellison, Schneider & Harris, Ms. Haug has assisted Vote Solar with participation in R.11-10-023, and expects to do so in future proceedings.

Ms. Haug's requested first-time representative hourly rate of \$395 for 2012 and 2013 is reasonable. It is less than the median authorized rate for attorneys with 13+ years of experience at the Commission and equal to or less than hourly rates authorized for other representatives with similar experience. For example, in 2010 and 2011, the Commission authorized an hourly rate of \$375 for Ann L. Trowbridge, which was increased to \$385 in 2012 (in Decision 13-02-019). For 2013, Ms. Trowbridge is seeking an hourly rate of \$400 (A.13-04-012, Agricultural Energy Consumers Association's Notice of Intent to Claim Intervenor Compensation, dated July 3, 2013). By reference to this and other recent determinations and filings for intervenor compensation rates, Ms. Haug's requested first-time representative hourly rate of \$395 for 2012 and 2013 is reasonable.
