On Monday night, PG&E lost a friend and colleague, David Andrews, who served as a member of the Boards of Directors of PG&E Corporation and the utility since 2000. Dave was 71 and had a fascinating career spanning law, government and business on a global scale. His roots, though, were in Northern California. He grew up in Oakland, graduated from Cal, lived in the Bay Area for many years and had recently moved to Healdsburg with his wife, Rozan.

Dave was among our longest-serving board members. His involvement included chairmanship of the Public Policy Committee as well as membership on the Executive Committee, Audit Committee, Nuclear Operations and Safety Committee, and Nominating and Governance Committee.

Dave brought a wealth of experience to the table. He retired from PepsiCo Inc. after serving as Senior Vice President, Government Affairs, General Counsel and Secretary. Before that he was counsel to three government agencies, including

the U.S. Department of State. His time in public service included representing the U.S. in all proceedings before the International Court of Justice, and conducting negotiations with the United Kingdom and the Netherlands over the trial of the two suspects in the 1988 bombing of Pan Am Flight 103.

In addition, he had expertise in environmental law and co-founded a company called MetaJure Inc. focusing on high-tech solutions for the legal industry. Dave served on various boards, including in the banking, health care, nonprofit and legal sectors.

Of course, in working with Dave, you would never have guessed his credentials. He was a humble, down-to-earth man and will be missed. We are honored that his contributions to PG&E are among the many facets of his legacy.
