Homemade buns, house-ground meat from an artisan butcher, really amazing cookies and lines around the block.

Overall: 4 1/2 star burgers.

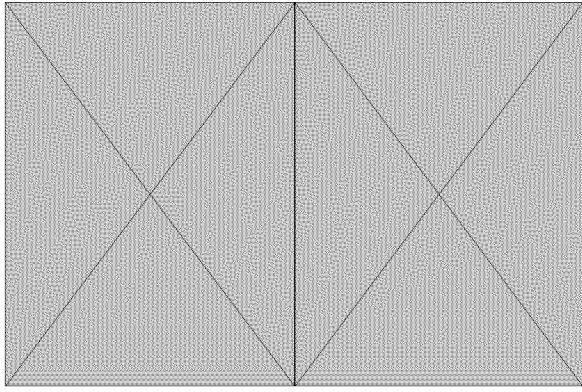

Marzia: "Stand over there. Kind of hunch over a little bit. Put your arm behind your back like that."

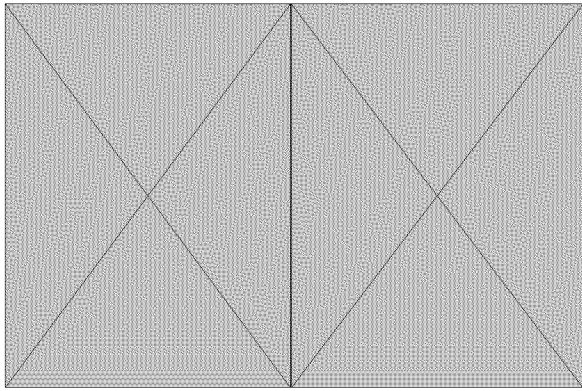

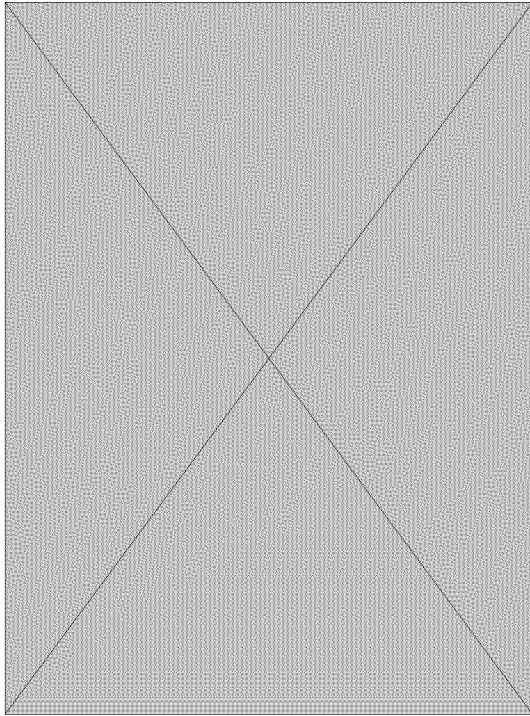
