Subject: A Message from Ed Halpin: DCPP Unit 2 Returned to Full Power

PG&E Officer Team;

The high energy swell warning issued yesterday was terminated today at 11:15 a.m., and Unit 2 began the ramp back to full power, reaching 100 percent at approximately 9:45 p.m. The decision was made after wave and swell data indicated improving ocean conditions and that the highest swells had subsided. Our intake systems effectively handled debris throughout the event.

Refueling continues on Unit 1, which remains in Mode 6.

The DCPP team responded in a professional manner, especially taking into consideration the level of activity on both units.

To provide some context, the energy of a swell is determined by its height and wavelength—conditions peaked at 6:38 a.m. this morning at 21 feet with a 14 second period (length)—the highest since January 2008. The video attached

illustrates these impressive numbers.
