- 1. Key CA state policies driving fundamental changes in the state's electricity market and decarbonization of the electric sector (e.g., the electric generation loading order, the GHG performance standard for new generation sources, AB-32 programs, including the 30% RPS and Cap-and-Trade);
- 2. CA's current plans for further decarbonization through 2050;
- 3. How key issues associated with the implementation of these policies have been addressed (e.g., electricity resource shuffling, potential rate impacts associated with 30% RPS implementation; Commission decisions related to GHG allowance trading and offset acquisition by IOUs, and electric dispatch and operational issues associated with integration of large-scale renewables and energy efficiency projects); and,
- 4. Views on the importance and potential for the state's AB-32 programs to be considered "equivalent" to forthcoming EPA New Source Performance Standards (NSPS) for *existing*

power sources to be issued under section 111(d) of the Clean Air Act.

**<u>RGGI</u>** – For the RGGI discussion, we would appreciate it if **Messrs Littell and Hachey** each can address some of the current issues and recently implemented changes in the RGGI program, including:

- 1. The recently completed RGGI program review, and the subsequent substantial reduction of the regional GHG emissions allowance cap;
- 2. The use of RGGI funds in the region to reduce GHG emissions and for related public purposes;
- 3. Views on the importance of, and potential for, the RGGI regional CO<sub>2</sub> cap-and-trade program to be considered "equivalent" to the forthcoming EPA New Source Performance Standards (NSPS) for existing sources to be issued under section 111(d) of the Clean Air Act.
- 4. Electric reliability considerations and responses amid the aftermath of the Super Storm Sandy and the Polar Vortex.
