RE: Resolution 465 Clarifications to SCE and SDG&E NEM Multiple Meter Aggregation
 Southern California Edison (SCE) filed a Notice of Intent to file a Resolution (SDG&E) filed a Notice of Intent to file a Resolution on January 15, 2014 to enable multiple aggregation pursuant to Senate Bill 594. CALSEIA and the California Solar Energy Industries Association (CSEIA) and the California Solar Energy Industries Association (CSEIA) protested the Resolution on January 1, 2014.
 The California Public Utilities Commission Resolution 465 adopted on June 2, 2014 to resolve the issues. These advice filings. CALSEIA strongly supports this resolution. Although the fees stipulated in the resolution greatly appreciate that they are in line with the fees for structure previously recommended by the Commission.
 One of the key activities in the meter aggregation process is necessary at first and the decision by each utility where process. There appears to be a belief by the utilities for large enough to warrant the investment.
 We are writing to express that there is a great need for aggregation among solar providers and we expect participation encourage actions by the Commission and help to reduce costs in the meter aggregation.
 CALSEIA notes that the draft resolution, like the disposition PG&E's meter aggregation program, does not address the California Solar Initiative (CSI) that in the past has been a protest. We recommend that the Commission consider the 2952-E-A. We recommend that the Commission consider the aggregated load be eligible for the CSI rebate. The resolution states "should be addressed" and the CSI rebates should be addressed. The Energy Division have the authority to address the Commission move quickly to resolve this issue.
