SUBJECT: CP National Order Authorizing Energy Rate Adjustments to Increase Annual Revenues for All Electric Districts

CP NATIONAL (CPN), by Advice Letters Nos. 221-E (Lassen), 220-E (Weaverville), both filed September 14, 1981 and as supplemented October 13, 1981, and 219-E (Needles) filed September 14, 1981, requests authority to increase its Energy Rates. These increases are composed of two components: one is to offset periodic increases in rates charged to CPN for purchased power, and the other is to amortize the undercollections which have accumulated in CPN's Purchased Power Cost Balancing Account. There are no changes in Base Rates. The proposed annual revenue increases are shown in the following table:

These filings comply with procedures contained in Parts D and F of CPN's Preliminary Statement.

The increases are being distributed on a uniform \$\psi/kWh\$ basis to each class of customer (1.448) \$\psi/kWh\$ for Lassen, 1.238 \$\psi/kWh\$ for Weaverville, and 1.187 \$\psi/kWh\$ for Needles). However, within the residential class this average increase is being allocated so that the ratio of the non-lifeline to lifeline total rate remains at the present differential.

The last increase for all three Electric Districts was approved by the Commission on June 16, 1981, by Resolution No. E-1925. CPN claims that the rate increase is necessary because of an increase in rates charged by Pacific Gas and Electric Company and approved by F.E.R.C. for the Lassen and Weaverville Districts. The increases in rates for the Needles District is based on fuel cost adjustment charges paid to Nevada Power Company.

In order to have approximately the same increases for all CPN customers, the staff of the Electric Branch recommends an eighteen month amortization period to be used for Needles and CPN's request for twelve months amortization time for same District be denied.

The proposed charges by CPN for Lassen and Weaverville and recommended charges by the staff of the Electric Branch for Needles are hereby found to be just and reasonable; therefore, good cause appearing:

IT IS ORDERED that CPN National shall file with the Commission revised tariff schedules for electric rates as set forth above on or after the effective date of this order. The revised tariff schedules shall become effective on the date of filing and shall apply only to service rendered on or after the effective date. The effective date of this Resolution is the date hereof.
