SUBJECT: Order Authorizing Deviation From a Portion of Section 5.e.1.
 of General Order No. 94-A

WHEREAS: PACIFIC GAS AND ELECTRIC COMPANY by letter dated August 10, 1966, having requested authority under Section 1 of General Order No. 94-A to deviate from the specified procedure required by Section 5.e.1. of this order with respect to the vigintiennial inspection of liquid hydrocarbon storage vessels, as outlined in said letter, and

WHEREAS: The utility has requested the use of the non-destructive reflectoscope method when examining for internal corrosion during the inspection of its 24 liquid hydrocarbon vessels only, and

WHEREAS: If the results of any such test indicate a vessel to be in a defective or hazardous condition, it must be removed from service, repaired and tested in accordance with Article 19, Section 5000 of the Liquefied Petroleum Gases Safety Orders issued by the Division of Industrial Safety before it is again placed in service, and

WHEREAS: Such deviation will relieve the utility from unnecessary expenses, hardship, disruption of service, and, good cause appearing,

IT IS ORDERED that authority be granted under Section 768 of the Public Utilities Code for Pacific Gas and Electric Company to carry out the inspection procedure as outlined in its letter of August 10, 1966, under the condition stated herein.
