Re: General Order 88-B Request for Authority to Alter San Miguel Road At-Grade Highway-Rail Crossing, CPUC Crossing No. 005-56.80 and DOT No. 498569V in the City of Santa Rosa, County of Sonoma

Dear Mr. Gamlen:

This refers to your letter dated July 28, 2014, received by us on July 29, 2014, requesting authorization, pursuant to California Public Utilities Commission (Commission) General Order (GO) 88-B, to alter the San Miguel Road at-grade highway-rail crossing (crossing) of Sonoma-Marín Area Rail Transit District (SMART) track in the City of Santa Rosa (City), Sonoma County. The crossing is identified as CPUC Crossing No. 005-56.80 and DOT No. 498569V.

The single skewed track crossing is equipped with one curb mounted Commission Standard 9-A (flashing light signal assembly with automatic gate arm and additional flashing light signals over the roadway on a cantilevered arm) and one curb mounted Commission Standard 9 (flashing light signal assembly with automatic gate arm) warning devices. There is a gated private driveway on the southwest quadrant of the crossing, part of a residential neighborhood. Northwestern Pacific Railroad Company (NWP) runs approximately 2 freight trains per week at a maximum speed of 45 mph over the crossing. North Coast Railroad Authority (NCRA) is the State agency charged with bringing freight operations to the Highway 101 corridor. NWP is the freight operator contracted by NCRA. SMART transit passenger service is scheduled to begin in late 2016 with a projected 32 trains per day. The average daily traffic on San Miguel Road is 5,394 vehicles.

The proposed alterations as indicated in the request letter and/or shown in the attachments shall consist of:

- Removing curb and gutter in the southeast quadrant of the crossing to accommodate new concrete crossing panels;
- Relocating the existing Commission Standard 9-A in the southwest quadrant of the crossing to accommodate the new detectable warning tactile strip;
- Installing precast concrete (PCC) crossing panels for the mainline track;

- Constructing curb, gutter and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant PCC sidewalks in the northwest quadrant of the crossing;
- Constructing ADA compliant PCC sidewalks in the northeast, southeast, and southwest quadrants of the crossing;
- Installing pedestrian pathway pavement markings through the crossing on both approaches;
- Installing ADA compliant detectable warning strips on the northeast and southwest sidewalk approaches just outside the warning devices from the track;
- Installing ADA compliant detectable warning tactile strips on the northwest and southeast sidewalk approaches, located a minimum of 12 feet from the centerline of the track;; and
- Applying California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (CA MUTCD) compliant signage and pavement markings, including W10-1, and W48(CA) advance warning signs, RXR and railroad limit pavement markings as shown on plans.

Although the Multi-Use Path (MUP) is shown on the plan, this letter does not provide Commission approval for any MUP work. The MUP project will be reviewed and addressed separately from the proposed alterations described above.

Commission's Rail Crossing Safety Section (RCSS) staff has investigated SMART's request, and finds it adequately addresses compliance and safety. As SMART, NCRA, and the City are in agreement as to the design and apportionments of the cost under the provisions of GO 88-B, you may proceed with the improvements as described in your request letter, attachments, and summarized above.

SMART must also ensure that Emergency Notification Signs are installed to comply with CFR 234.309.

Temporary traffic controls shall be provided in compliance with Section 8A.08, Temporary Traffic Control Zones, of the CA MUTCD, 2012 Edition, published by the California Department of Transportation.

All parties shall comply with all applicable rules, including Commission General Orders and CA MUTCD.

This project is categorically exempt from the requirements of the California Environment Quality Act of 1970, as amended [California Pubic Resources Code 21084].

This authorization shall expire if the above conditions are not complied with or if the work is not completed within three years of the date of this letter. Upon written request to this office, the time to complete the project may be extended. Any written request for a time extension must include concurrence letters by involved parties in support of the time extension. If an extension is requested, the RCSS may reevaluate the crossing prior to granting an extension.

Within 30 days after completion of this project, SMART shall notify RCSS that the authorized work is completed, by submitting a completed Commission Standard Form G. Form G requirements and



At the conclusion of the project, SMART should submit an updated Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) inventory form to the FRA, reflecting the changes. Commission requests a concurrent copy of the updated inventory form be submitted to rces@cpuc.ca.gov.
